Welcome to Brownell and Kvamsing Lakes Fly - In Fishing Camps.

Peaceful tranquility, clear blue waters and bountiful catches of Northern Pike and Walleye await you at our three cabins on Brownell Lake, or our single outpost cabin on Kvamsing Lake.

For decades these camps have offered guests the comforts of a northern lodge with the benefits of a relaxing break from civilization and being alone. After a short flight you'll find comfortable cabins with screened in decks overlooking tranquil blue water. Our camps offer hot shower facilities and outdoor flush toilets. To improve your fishing experience you will find a filleting shack, fridge, freezer, and fishing boats.

Building on the legacy of Ted Ohlsen, along with being a "self-serve" camp we offer an optional guiding service. Our experienced and friendly guide is available to show you the local secret fishing holes, filet your fish and create a shore lunch for you to enjoy during your fishing experience. These beautiful lakes surrounded by nature are also a photographer's paradise. Local nesting eagles, moose and the iconic loon are only a few of the animals regularly seen in the area. Your cabins are surrounded by nature's beauty. A short trip from the cabins provides a photographic safari difficult to equal.

Fly fisherman love the large northern pike filled bays to test their strength against a big "gator" or drop a fly into the flowing waters in front of the Brownell camp for a golden walleye!

It is our commitment to have you arrive as a guest and leave as a friend.

OUR FACILITIES

Our accommodations consist of four individual guest cabins, three located on Brownell lake and one secluded cabin on Kvamsing Lake.

Our cabins have an incredible view of the lake and provide comfortable living quarters for up to six people per cabin.

All of our cabins are outfitted with solar powered lights, running water, an outdoor flush toilet and a hot shower house. All cooking utensils, cleaning supplies and toilet paper are provided for each cabin. Even better, there is a fireplace to stay warm and a refrigerator to keep you drinks and food cold.

To prepare your catch of the day, we have a filet table with a hand water pump and a gut tub. There is a fire-pit to spend the evening around and prepare your food the old fashioned way.

Boats are provided at each camp. Gasoline for the boats and life jackets are also provided. Additionally, there is a cell phone booster for emergencies and urgent contact.

KVAMSING CAMP

LOCATION & DIRECTIONS

Brownell and Kvamsing Lake are located in beautiful northern Saskatchewan. These secluded lakes are found between La Ronge and Pelican Narrows and are only accessible by float plane.

To access the lakes, float plane flights provided by Wings Over Kississing depart from Twin Bay Resort at Deschambeault Lake. Clients are required to arrive one hour before departure times and each is person is allowed 75 lbs of gear. Remember this is the north and flight times are weather dependant.

There are plenty of places to stay in the area the night before your flight if needed. Our recommendation is Twin Bay Lodge. Additionally, there is parking available for the duration of your trip. All final departure details will be confirmed during the booking process.

LOCATION & DIRECTIONS

*Requirements

- Guests must arrive 60 minutes prior to departure
- Each person is allowed up to 75 lbs of gear

Directions & Information:

- 1. Flight times are weather dependent so that is why we ask you to be ready well before your scheduled flight time. If your plane is late, please be patient, the weather is likely the cause of the delay and be assured the flight operator will pick you up as soon as it is safe! The same goes for departure from camp, be ready early, but be prepared for potential delays.
- 2. Take HWY 106. Turn North on RD 911 to get to Twin Bays Resort at Deschambault Lake. Twin Bay Resort is where you will fly out from. It is to the left of "the big house" on top of the hill. It is BEFORE the village. PARKING: Park your vehicles on the SOUTH SIDE of the resort. After unloading your gear at the dock, look for our sign.
- 3. There are plenty of places to stay in the area the night before you fly if needed. Twin Bay Resort 1-306-632-4767
- 4. Please have all your gear to one side of the dock & keep in mind, small bags pack into planes better! When the plane arrives, passengers coming off will unload first, then you will help the pilot load your gear on. (Flight to the camps takes about 15-20 mins.)

RULES & REGULATIONS

The staff at Brownell/Kvamsing want your trip to be an enjoyable experience, so please review before you leave on your adventure:

- Review your packing list with your party so you don't forget important clothing items, food items and fishing gear.
- Use of Dry Bags to pack your clothes is a great idea as the weather does not always cooperate.
- Do not pack more than you need and remember: Large duffle bags are difficult to load on the plane – you have a maximum of 75 lbs/person including food allowed on your flight.
- Know where your flight leaves from and be early (1 hour before departure is recommended) – Internet service is limited on the highway to Twin Bay Resorts so do not rely on Google Maps- print off a copy of the directions to Twin Bay Resorts before you leave home. There is a parking area where you will leave your vehicle after unloading your gear on the dock.
- Wear rubber boots for departure loading/unloading gear is always better in dry feet
- Review Saskatchewan Environment rules and regulation for fishing
- Have you taken the required boating licence? Safety makes your trip so much more enjoyable.
- Hopefully you do not experience a fishing hook in the wrong place but in case you do we provide a commercial hook remover kit, located in your medical kit inside each cabin. We also recommend you buy one and have it inside your fishing box. We promote and strongly encourage barbless hooks.
- Upon arrival at camp remember there may be a group departing after you unload so as your plane is unloaded place all your items off the docking area and keep an eye on it. You do not want your gear reloaded on the plane!

RULES & REGULATIONS

Rules & Regulations continued:

- After you open the cabin door and unpack get familiar with your surroundings, have a look at the shower house, filleting area, boat house and tool house
- If you are in camp with other guests, introduce yourselves and remember to respect your neighbours during your stay.
- Comfort and safety- We do provide CSA approved life jackets but you may want to look at an inflatable vest (believe us when we say you wont even know you are wearing this style)

Sorry, but you will have to leave, so on departure day:

- Clean your cabin for the next guests (brooms/mops/buckets are in each cabin)
- Take all your items and ensure fridge and freezer is empty (feel free to leave behind bottled water)
- Double bag all garbage to be loaded on the plane
- Compact cans in separate bags for pilot
- Maybe leave a note for the next guest.....maybe a hot fishing spot?
- Your departure time may vary due to weather or unforeseen circumstances but please be ready on the dock will all your gear and garbage 60 minutes before your scheduled departure time
- Clean your boat and maybe even fill the fuel tank as the new guest will be a little excited to get on the water and just may forget to check fuel level in the tank on the boat

If you have read this far, we thank you! You deserve a hot tip so take your boat 30 yards off the docking area and drop your anchor in the middle of the small bay facing the creek mouth. Take a jig or soft body and drop it to the bottom...jig it... cast it... & enjoy lunch!

DEPARTURE DAY CHECKLIST

*Please ensure the following are complete before leaving the camp.

- Left over bait can be left in tool house freezer

- Leave a note for the next guest if you like.

OUR FAQ'S

What is Light Housekeeping?

Simple, you bring all your food, clothes, bedding and fishing gear. The cabin has a good supply of dishes, cooking surfaces, fridge, freezer, outdoor bbq(remember this is all powered by solar energy so no oven, microwave or crock pot). Light housekeeping means that the cabin is only as clean for the next person as you leave it. Please remember to clean up and haul out your garbage. Boats, motors, fuel, life jackets, paddles, maps are ready for you. There is a shower house, filleting shack and additional freezing facilities down at the dock. Remember you are allowed 75 lbs /person on the plane. This includes food, fishing gear, bedding and clothing.

What is you cancellation policy?

If your reservation is cancelled before making your final payment your deposit is non-refundable if your departure date is less than 90 days from the date of cancellation. If your departure date is more than 90 days from the date of cancellation, you may use your deposit for another booking no more than one year in the future. If you cancel your reservation after your final payment there is no refund as final payment is due in full 30 days prior to your departure date.

When is the best time to book?

There is no right or wrong answer to when the best time is for walleye and northern pike fishing. Every month of our fly in fishing season offers different weather, colors, and fish activity. If you are not fond of the cold, then late June-through August is your ideal fishing time. If you want colour, then late August is your choice as fall color is in full view. If you like walleye, the beginning of June is your choice time. Monster trophy Northern Pike, June, mid July-through August. You will not be disappointed.

OUR FAQ'S

Do I need a fishing guide?

Brownell or Kvamsing Lakes do not require a fishing guide for you to enjoy our fisheries. In fact, most guests prefer to explore our Boreal lakes on their own. With these lakes dropping a hook anywhere will give you an excellent chance to get a bite. If navigating a boat does not sound ideal to you or you just want a carefree day of fly in fishing, a friendly and knowledgeably fishing guide is available with advance notice.

How many guests are in camp with me?

While many fishing lodges have upwards of 40+ guests at a time, making the most secluded place feel crowded. We take a different approach, smaller lodge- max occupancy of 18 guests at Brownell Lake- 6 in each cabin - 6 guests in Kvamsing Lake. You can reserve the whole camp at Brownell Lake with a group of 12. Minimum group of 4 in Kvamsing Lake

Are there laundry facilities?

No laundry facilities so please take along ample clothing for all weather conditions. Have a look at the guest review section for ideas on your packing list! Please don't wash your clothes in the lake. The soap isn't good for the fish.

Is there a limit to the amount of fuel I can use?

NO.... fish 100 feet off the docks for one hour (and by the way this spot can produce monsters) or fish 12 hours a day exploring the lakes. We do encourage you to use the gas responsibly. After all, we want to keep this lake a pristine as possible for generations to come.

OUR FAQ'S

Do I need a fish finder?

You don't need one. It is nearly impossible not to find them. It is a little like bringing a sand finder to the Sahara. However, Brownell Kvamsing currently does not furnish depth finders. We do provide detailed lamented fisheries maps of our waters. Usually, 1 out of 20 guests bring a fish finder. If you plan on purchasing a depth finder for your trip, we suggest buying an inexpensive simple fish finder that performs basic depth reading.

Is there Internet?

Yes, although it is limited you can access the internet on both Brownell and Kvamsing Lakes. We of course recommend only using the internet for emergencies or critical calls, remember you are on holidays!





